- We have guidance for all teachers on supporting students who are LGBT+
- We are part of the 'No Outsiders' programme, which encourages inclusivity in schools and is based around the Equality Act 2010.
- We hold 'No Outsiders' drop-ins on Wednesday during break times, where students can ask questions or just have a chat.
- We discuss LGBT+ identities in our JBACC lessons
- We have a zero-tolerance policy to hate-speech, including the use of the word 'gay' in a negative way. We make it clear that students are free to hold their own views on LGBT+ issues but must always treat each other with respect.


U15 200m Champion!

Student Report - Electronic Music Enrichment




In our electronic music production elective, students ages 13-16 create music using a software called Mixcraft. Mixcraft has a lot of different sounds, loops and instruments for pupils to explore. The elective leader, Ollie Millin, is a professional musician and has previously been in a duo creating electronic music.

Mixcraft is an easy software for creating music, with a library full of different styles of music. There are also loops, sounds and beats from various different instruments. We also use midi boards; electric boards that look a little bit like mini keyboards, which people can use to create their tracks/loops and sounds using different instruments that can be selected on the software. The musical pieces the students have created span many genres, from jazz all the way to upbeat pop. You can really see the reflection of them in their music, what they like, what they don't like, their thoughts, their feelings and how they see things. This experience has also been educational for all of the students, they have learnt how to use different techniques and developed their skills in using music software. Some of the pupils came knowing a lot about electronic music production and some came knowing only the basics or nothing at all. However, everyone has created amazing music and has learnt a lot of techniques and skills during the course. Ollie is always happy to help, including giving hints and tips to help pupils progress. He also helps students individually and makes each and every one of us create music to the best of our ability.

Ollie said that he has "always wanted to teach" so when this offer came along, he immediately took it. He is passionate about this subject and helping to improve students' knowledge in a way that they can understand. Ollie said that his favourite thing is seeing people progress throughout the weeks and "seeing how diverse everyone's style is".

Teaching and Learning - Spotlight on Coaching at St James


Improving Teaching and Learning is at the heart of everything we do at St James, and this is a great opportunity to inform you of how we ensure that our teachers receive regular feedback about their teaching and how to make incremental changes to improve their practice. At St James, each teacher has a coach who works alongside them and visits one of their lessons on a weekly basis. In the lesson visit, the coach will be looking out for the wonderful ways in which our teachers teach the students in their class, ready to feed back to them. They will also consider what small change the teacher could make that would have a significant impact on students' learning. This might be as small as where the teacher stands in the room or how the teacher uses the visualiser to explore a student's piece of work with the class or how the teacher uses storytelling and analogies to improve their explanations.

The coach and coachee meet after the lesson visit to explore this in more detail and to watch a video of their area for development (known as an action step) being modelled. With the support of the coach, the coachee then practises the action step without the presence of the students and keeps practising until they are ready to put it into practice with their classes. During the following week, the coach pops into the lesson to see how the teacher is getting on. We change the focus every half term, from themes like the quality of our explanations, to how we give effective feedback to how we ensure our expectations are high.

In addition to this, our Senior Team visit lessons regularly and award staff with 'positive shout-outs'. These are short, positive messages that arrive by email. It is great when the visit happens just at the same time as the teacher is practising their action step! In most weeks, there are 80-100 lessons visits at St James!
